Congressional Canvass

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No Senator or Representative in Congress, who regards the binding obligation of an oath, and his duty to guarantee to the people of a new State, a Republican form of government, can vote to admit Kansas with so monstrous a Constitution.

The Constitution does not define the duties and limit the powers of the Representatives of the people, but does confer on them the most unlimited, extraordinary and dangerous powers, destructive of republican liberty.

The Constitution purposely destroys the INDEPENDENT character of the Judiciary, which it is so essential to retain, in order to maintain just and equal "republican liberty," and prevent oppression and anarchy.

The Constitution does not declare the sacredness of "private property," but leaves it to be sacrificed without compensation. We have before us a memorable instance of a merchant having lost his lead for attempting to invade this sacred right.

If the subjects of a monarch would not admit of the perpetration of such a sacrilegious act, it is to be regretted that the people of a Republican Democracy to attempt it to tolerate it even for a day! Never shall we voluntarily do so.

The Constitution so arranges our "boundaries" for political purposes as to cut off from the proposed State a large body of land lying west of our western boundary, which was might obtain for railroads and purposes, and which we ought to obtain if we are admitted into the Union with the present Constitution.

In addition to the above objections to the Constitution there are many more equally obnoxious and anti-republican features, destructive of the "public good" and the liberties of the people of Kansas.

We care not who may advocate the admission of Kansas with this anti-republican Constitution, which is a source of danger to the Union, and the fundamental law of Kansas may have ceased.

Should we be declared a State under this Constitution, we hope the people of Kansas may elect a legislature under it in December next that will give the people a Convention to make a new Constitution.

Democratic Triumph. The Democracy of Kansas have forced the Abolitionists to acknowledge the Democratic principle that the people of a Territory have a right to institute or prohibit slavery in making a Constitution and State government as their interests may require.

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From the entire absence of any evidence on the records of Congress, of anything having been done by MARCUS J. PARROTT to promote the good of Kansas, we turn to a letter before us which has been placed in our hands, in which he admits that he did not do anything in favor of the settlers on the half-breed reservation; and as an excuse, says he could "hardly expect to do anything."

A most potent excuse, truly, for not trying to do anything. Every man must be fully impressed with the folly of any sending such a Delegate to Congress; one who is so deeply implicated in the Kansas conspiracy, and who has completely destroyed all chance of rendering the people of Kansas any service, by having laid himself a willing instrument in the hands of the outside demagogues and traitors who care nothing for Kansas, and only desire to use it as a cat's paw to make political capital for them.

If the people of Kansas desire land grants for railroads, public buildings, common roads and bridges and other purposes, they are sending a Delegate to Congress, to denounce the Administration and the Democratic party, and consume his time in fringing Abolitionist speeches, must be apparent to every one.

No man who will go to Washington as a Delegate from this or any other Territory, desiring to raise and maintain a denunciation of the Administration, can expect to do any good for Kansas, and the settlers can only be disappointed in their interests and be made to advance the political interests of political schemers who have too long already been permitted to make a fool ball of Kansas and her affairs.

Every Democrat who reflects for one moment, must see that the false abuse of a Democratic Administration, is the only an indirect mode of stabilizing the Democratic party, besides such and every charge made by those who make them, to be factually, they have signally failed to do so.

On the contrary, we have repeatedly proven their falsity, by a reference to the facts on the record, which they have not dared to friskly meet and confess.

They have falsely accused Democrats with commencing the outrages in Kansas, which is not true, and which their own record is not passed shows to be false.

They have charged the Administration with using the military power of the Government with impunity, which the official record shows to be false, and all who were here know that the officers of the army did not to protect pro-slavery men.

We know that when called on as a posse to aid any one of the civil authorities, they have not only refused to do so, but have been against with the civil officer had writ, without arresting them, or even seeming to notice them, and at the worst, whatever injustice may have been done to any one or excess may have been committed, arose from want of judgment or the complication of difficulties surrounding the civil officer, and not by the orders of the Government.

Col. Lays, in July, 1856, at a time of profound peace, marched into the Territory with a large force of armed men, and threatened the lives and property of the settlers. This alarmed the people and called out another armed body to oppose him. Lays was a mere tool in the hands of "know-nothing" managers, and PARROTT was his African chief, and he used the Territory to raise excitement and commotion, and to induce others to do the same.

They laid a train to cause the complete destruction of Lawrence, and were foiled by Democrats. All sorts of villainous schemes were laid to make capital to secure the success of Fremont to the Presidency, in all of which they failed.

The Republican leaders repudiated the people of Kansas, so as to prevent the formation and adoption of a pro-slavery Constitution for Kansas, to which their prediction truly that "a slave Territory must necessarily become a slave State," which prediction is now proven to be false.

In the fall of 1857 the Republican leaders again opposed the voting policy, which they now own the sense of the settlers, because they feared their interest in the trick of keeping them from voting.

In the winter of 1858 Lays discovered the Legislature to pass a Militia Bill, creating him Commander-in-Chief, but which failed to become a law; yet he complained to organize the Militia, and commissioned the notorious Jan-Heavin, Major-General of Linn county, a captain, to lead the militia, and he invaded the polls at Sugar Mountain, Linn county, where he used his military force to prevent the vote by anti-slavery men, and in violation of the orders of the Republican leaders, and trampled the ballot of Fremont under his feet. If not, arouse to action and hurl back in their teeth the stereotyped false charges which they utter against a Democratic Administration that defended our right to change a Constitution in 1858 which these Republican leaders tried to fasten on you by their own power to substitute a pro-slavery Constitution for the one of your fathers, long since a State at the time. There are facts which the record will substantiate. Challenge your enemies to do the record.

On Thursday evening Judge JOHNSTON and M. J. PARROTT addressed the citizens of Lawrence. We have not time to give a full report of the speeches delivered on that occasion.
