A gentleman in this city has placed at our disposal two letters of recent date, from which we make some interesting extracts. One, it will be perceived, announces the death of Messra. Woodson & Farris, and states that many other Virginians have been made prisoners by the free soil party. We have reason to believe that the writer has been misinformed in regard to these matters, though we shall await further tidings with much amiety.

KANSAS CITY, Aug. 19, 1866.

Dear——I am grieved to inform you that I have just heard of the death of Woodson and of Charley Farris, and that T. S. McKlöney, Charley McKinney, Charley Otty and all the Virginia boys are prisoners. I have no doubt they will meet the fate of Woodson and Farris.—They defended Lecompton all day last Sunday, but owing to superiority of numbers, had to surrender. Woodson's and Col. Titus' houses were blown to pieces. We hear of nothing but distress now from Kansas, and while I write companies are being formed to go to their relief. Col. McCarty and all one folks will leave to-night. We will go in this time with a force sufficient, to clean out Kansas you may rely on that; and this attack will make Kansas a slave State, beyond all doubt. Let me assure you that Missourinas will never go into Ensas again without diving out the last secundrel. Before eight days have elapsed, Missouri will send in five thouspin "border ruffiner," and they will never leave as long as there is an abolition it in that beautiful territory.
