Rev Mr Nute, in a letter to the Boston Transcript, gives this discription of the dungeon in which he was confined with

"We were locked up with thirteen others in a foul dungeon—a place which de-

serves commemoration, with the Bastile and the Black Hole of Calcutta. For the credit of the community by whom it was built, it should have a faithful description. Its walls are of stone, two feet thick, enclosing a space 10 feet by 15, and, about 10 feet high. The door is of solid from The light and, entilation furnished by 4, apertures near, the top, 5 inches by 18; in which are set from bars so as to fill up about, three quarters, of the, space. On inquiry, we found that most of our fellow prisoners had been taken, the day before, from their homes near town, without any charge or pretext. Several were arrested, on their way from different parts of the territory, intending to go down the river."
