A friend of ours, just returned from St. Louis, informs us that on his trip down the river he was much of the time in company with the noted Col. Titus, and reports him very jubitant over Col. Thus, and reports him very jubilant over their prospects of success in the Gotober election. Thus says, "ho knows the Pro-Slavery party will succeed," and adds, "Why shouldn't we rejoice over it? We have got the thing all fixed, and success is certain. The Constitutional Convention will adjourn" (this was before the adjournment) "nuttl after the election. It will then meet and pass a Pro-Slavery Constitution, sub-mit it under restrictions that the mass of Free
