

AID FOR NICARAGUA.—Col. Titus, with one hundred and twenty emigrants wishing to proceed to Nicaragua, arrived in the city yesterday. Some twenty also arrived from Texas. Quite a large number of others, it is understood, are anxious to cast their fortunes in that country, but lack the means of conveyance thither as speedily as is desirable, not being willing to wait for the return steamer, which sails on the 27th of next month. They wish to go immediately, and are not prepared to wait doing nothing for almost thirty days.

There is no possibility of these men proceeding to Nicaragua except by the next steamer, unless a sailing vessel is provided for them. We think one should be so provided in two or three days, and rely upon the liberality of our citizens to effect that object. We understand a contribution will be asked for to-day or to-morrow. Let not the appeal be made in vain.
