Kansas Election. STUTENDOUS FRAUDS.—By means of a most barefaced piece of villiany, in the carrying out of

which Col. Titus and Sheriff Jones, were the principal agents—the proslavery party have succeeded in reducing Parrott's majority down to about 1,000, and the Legislature to nearly a tie. A single illus-

tration will serve to show in what manner this was brought about. When the polls closed in the Oxford precinct on election day not more than 70 votes had been cast, that is not more than four times the number which could legally have been given in a town numbering just eleven houses, all told. The next morning Col. Titus and Sheriff Jones rode down to Oxford and had a conference with the judges and clerks of election. The polls were presently opened again, but not to receive votes; simply for the convenience of the judges, who devoted the day to registering fictitious names. By nightfall 1,564 votes were registered; and Johnson County is now officially reported to have been carried by 1604 majority. Should these false returns be thrown out the Free State men will have a decided maj. in the Legislature. We shall see whether the Administration will dare to sanction this villiany. several prominent citizens of Kansas was filed on the 15th against frradulent returns of Oxford precinct, Johnson County, in reply to which, after personal investigation, Walker and Stanton publish a proclamation in the Herald of Freedom of the 20th expressing the determination to reject the entire vote of Oxford and give certificates to the Free State candidates. The proclamation produced intense excitement among the extreme proslavery men. Threats of vengeance were made against
