The Treasury Notes. The issue of treasury notes by the general government is a favorite because simple and speedy form of raising money with an embarrassed administration.

Authorized to meet the exigencies of the U. S. treasury for the next year, the secretary of the treasury proposes to put out six millions at once, or as soon as they can be prepared, which will take about a fortnight.

Though this is a favorite mode of raising money with the administrations of the government, it has generally been condemned by the wisest of our statesmen.

Mr Woodbury, then secretary of the treasury, proposed notes of as low a denomination as \$20, without interest, and redeemable at no fixed period.

Mr Webster opposed the secretary's recommendation. He declared the proposed notes, without interest, and unlimited in time, to be a bill to germinate a new paper-money.

The Senate disapproved the secretary's plan, and a bill was reported that body for notes not less than \$100, and bearing interest, so as to be used for investment.

Mr Benton, though opposed to the policy of issuing treasury notes, defended this bill against the charge of being a paper-money bill.

Mr Clay thought a whole plan a government bank in disguise. Reduction, economy and retrenchment in government expenditures, he deemed better than such an issue.

The Mormons. A letter from the camp of the Utah expedition, dated Nov. 5th, states that a writ had been served on Joseph Taylor, the Mormon prisoner, charging him with high treason.

Fort Bridger, where the Utah troops had nearly reached at last accounts, is 113 miles from Salt Lake City, but between that fort and the city all the great obstacles to the march of the army are interposed.

A smart shock of earthquake was felt at Augusta, Me., and the neighboring towns, about 2 o'clock, Wednesday afternoon.

RETURN OF THE FOREIGN PRESIDENT OF NICARAGUA.—Fillibuster Walker has for the second time been rescued from a pirate's fate in Nicaragua and brought home by the United States government.

It is said that Walker shed tears when he hauled down his flag and surrendered to the United States forces. The captain of the British man-of-war Braavens had previously threatened to dislodge Walker if the United States commander did not do it.

Col Anderson with fifty of Walker's men were holding Fort Castello, on the San Juan river, when Walker left. He requested that notice should be given them of his departure.

The convention of the republicans of Mr Banks' district to select a successor to him in Congress meets at South Reading on Friday, 1st.

George B. Butler, late one of the editors of the Journal of Commerce, and an ardent friend of Mr Buchanan's election, and William H. Ludlow, one of the New York delegates to the Cincinnati convention, and an original Buchanan man, wrote letters to the late administration meeting in Tammany Hall.

The Richmond Enquirer sees a little of the daylight ahead about the insularity of the South and the union of the North promises for our national government, and calls upon its associates to halt as follows:—
